



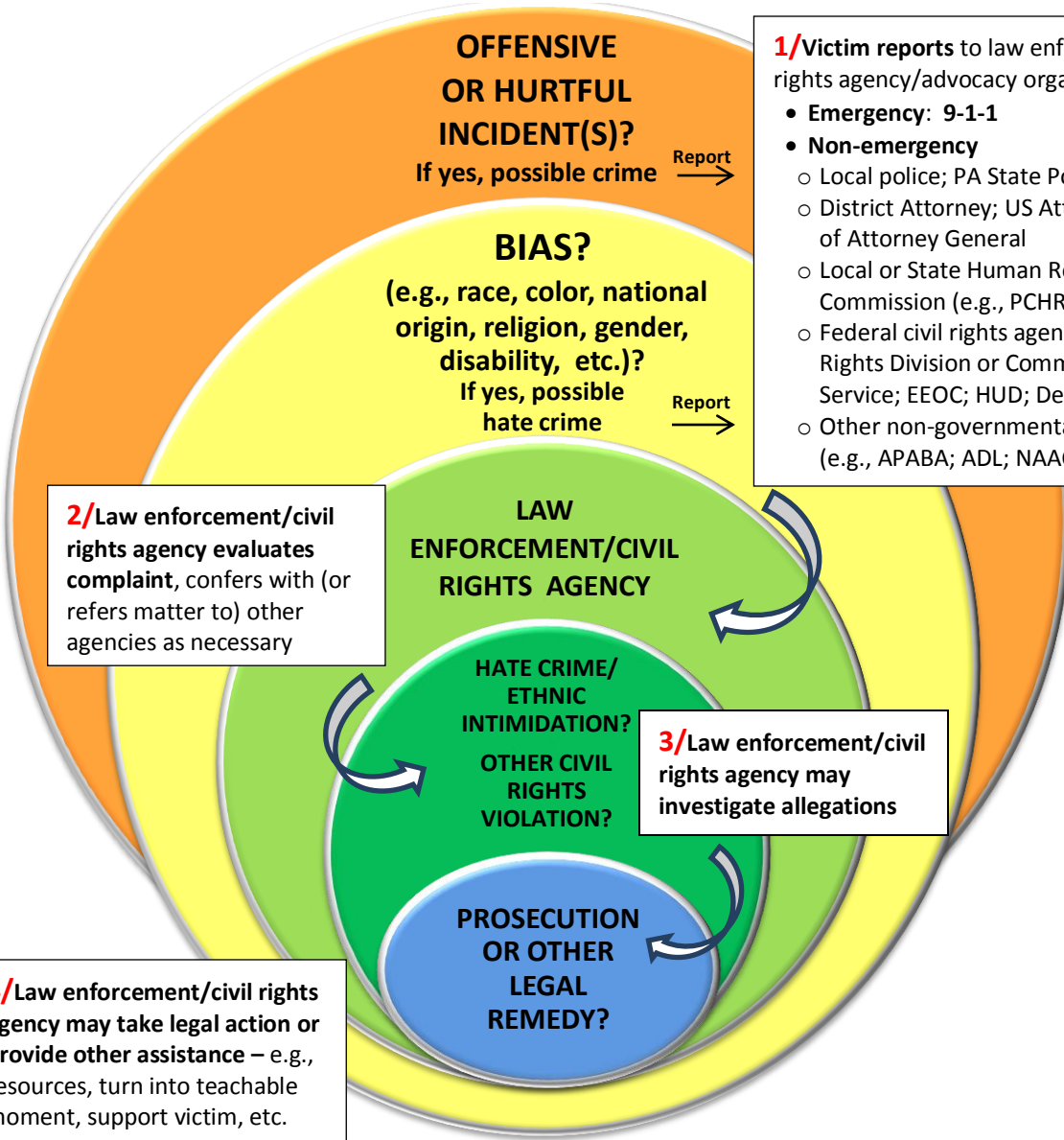
REPORTING BIAS INCIDENTS AND HATE CRIMES AND WHAT TO EXPECT FROM LAW ENFORCEMENT/CIVIL RIGHTS AGENCIES

Bias Incident:
Offensive or hurtful act that is not a crime but is motivated by bias or prejudice.

Hate Crime/Ethnic Intimidation:
Criminal act motivated by malicious intent toward another person's race, color, religion, national origin, gender, disability, etc. (coverage varies by jurisdiction).

Unlawful Discriminatory Practice: Civil rights statutes make it a civil offense to discriminate in various contexts: e.g., employment; housing; commercial property; public accommodations; education (coverage varies by jurisdiction).

FIRST AMENDMENT:
Guarantees freedom of speech and expression but not absolute



1/Victim reports to law enforcement/civil rights agency/advocacy organization:

- **Emergency: 9-1-1**
- **Non-emergency**
 - Local police; PA State Police; or FBI
 - District Attorney; US Attorney; PA Office of Attorney General
 - Local or State Human Relations Commission (e.g., PCHR, PghCHR, PHRC)
 - Federal civil rights agency (e.g., DOJ/Civil Rights Division or Community Relations Service; EEOC; HUD; Dep't of Ed.)
 - Other non-governmental organization (e.g., APABA; ADL; NAACP; etc.)

2/Law enforcement/civil rights agency evaluates complaint, confers with (or refers matter to) other agencies as necessary

3/Law enforcement/civil rights agency may investigate allegations

4/Law enforcement/civil rights agency may take legal action or provide other assistance – e.g., resources, turn into teachable moment, support victim, etc.

Victim may seek civil remedies in some circumstances (seek attorney)

5/Complaints also help agencies:

- Monitor trends
- Compile/disseminate reports
- Conduct outreach
